Selecting a Conservator

Conservation is a mainly unregulated profession, so keep the following considerations in mind when selecting a conservator.

- Ask for the conservator's qualifications and references. Take the time to check the references.
- Ask to see examples or slides of the conservator's work.
- Seek advice or recommendations from other institutions for whom the conservator has done work.
- The conservator should be able to explain in plain terms what is involved in the treatment of an item, what materials will be used, and what, if any, risk exists.
- The conservator should always provide a written condition report, a treatment proposal and a complete treatment record.
